### **Discussion and Study Guide**

This small booklet may be used in a variety of ways as it contains a simple study guide for discussing "The Really Good News About God" as a whole, followed by separate study guides for each chapter of the book.

Each study guide has two parts – a Review and Reflection section followed by a Bible Study section for those who wish to explore the main ideas of the book more deeply.

The Review and Reflection sections would easily lend themselves to small groups of those who have already read the book and the Bible Study sections might encourage individuals to do some private research and thinking before joining with others to discuss their findings and opinions.

For those who wish to explore a chapter even more thoroughly, other quotes from the pages of "The Really Good News About God" could be selected as the focus of further study using the suggested Bible Study format. Indeed, some additional quotes are appended to get you started.

Whichever route you take, however you use this resource, be prepared to explore, question, research, debate. Be open to the leading of the Holy Spirit as you seek to discover God's truth about himself and his purpose and plans for his creation.

But our final destination, the ultimate outcome, has already been chosen by the Sovereign God, who loves us, wants the best for us and will make sure we get it."
